Pending city approvals, Maria's Cafe plans to operate from Tuesday to Sunday, focusing on morning and early afternoon service. The café will serve a variety of coffee beverages and hot-food options while also offering catering for Arts @ Large events, reinforcing its role as a community gathering spot.

According to **Urban Milwaukee**, the menu will feature a range of hot and iced espresso drinks, including lattes, mochas, and the traditional Mexican café de olla, alongside flavored matcha lattes available in strawberry, mango, and pineapple. Patrons can also look forward to pastries, parfaits, breakfast sandwiches, wraps, and quesadillas. However, it's important to note that the café's facilities do not include a hood, preventing the preparation of fried items on-site.

Supporting Arts @ Large

Arts @ Large operates as a community center and gallery, hosting artist residencies, Milwaukee Public Schools programming, and rotating exhibits. Transition from Green Baked Goods

The bakery had been in operation at Arts @ Large since 2023 and continues to engage the community through market appearances.
